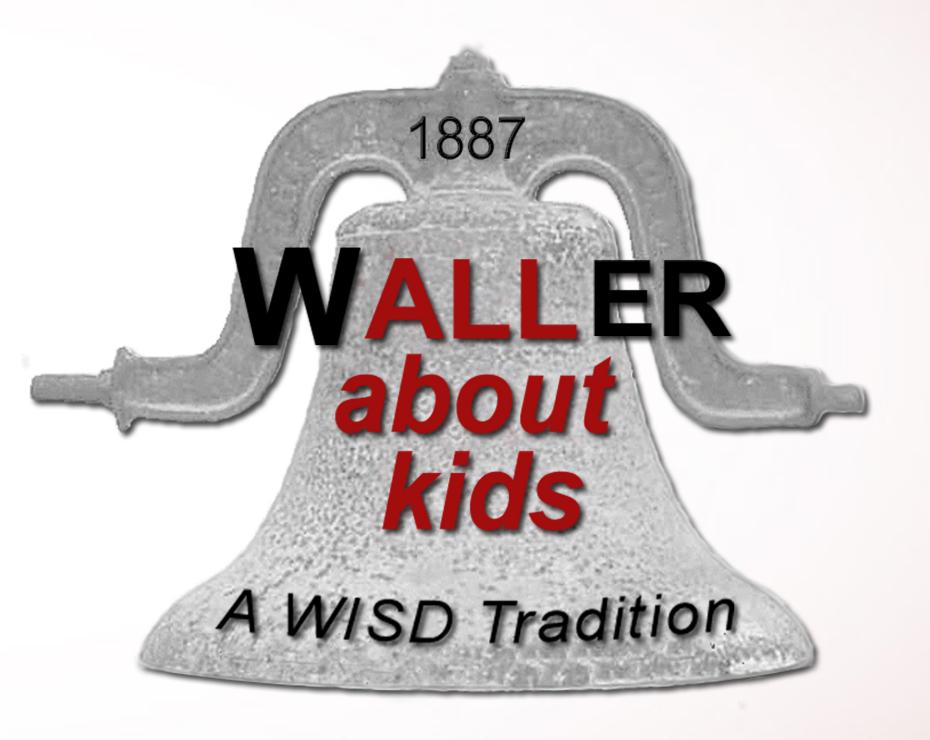
Waller ISD Mission Statement

(9) DIVERSITY

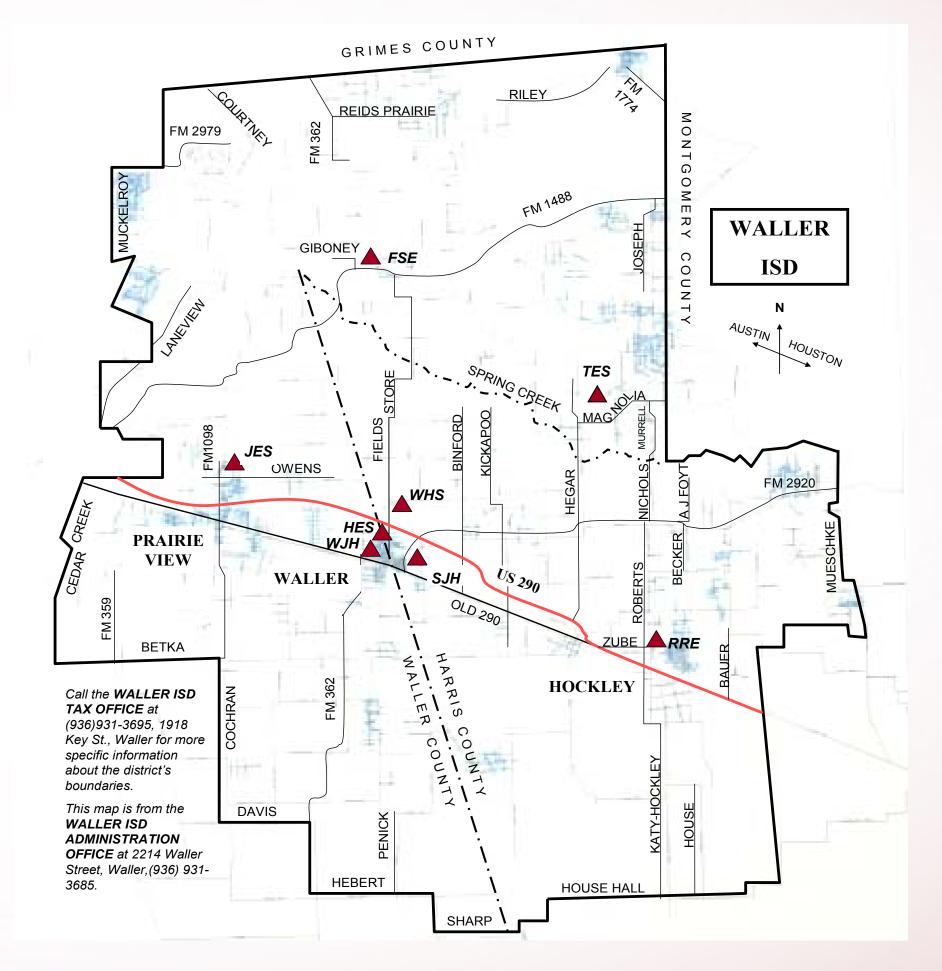

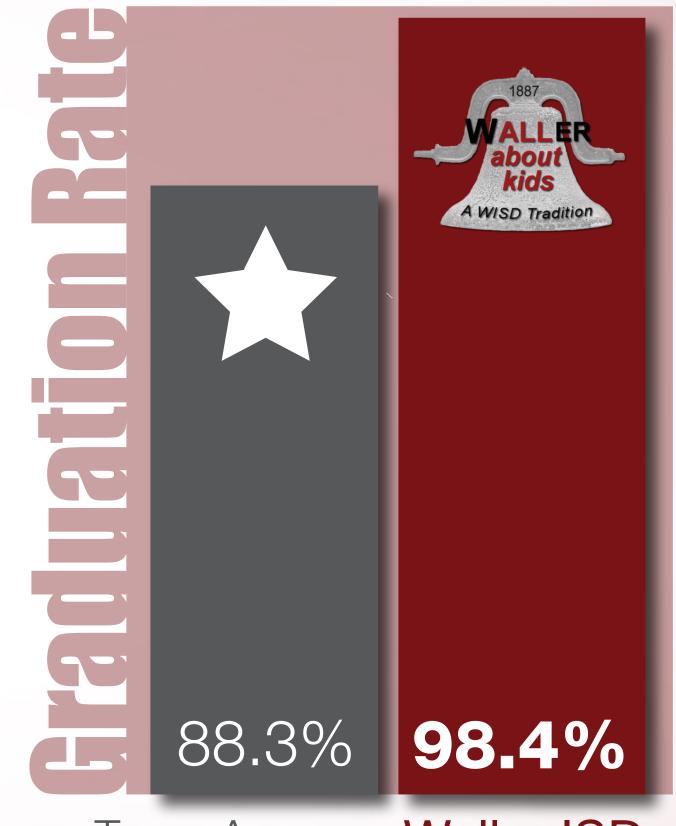

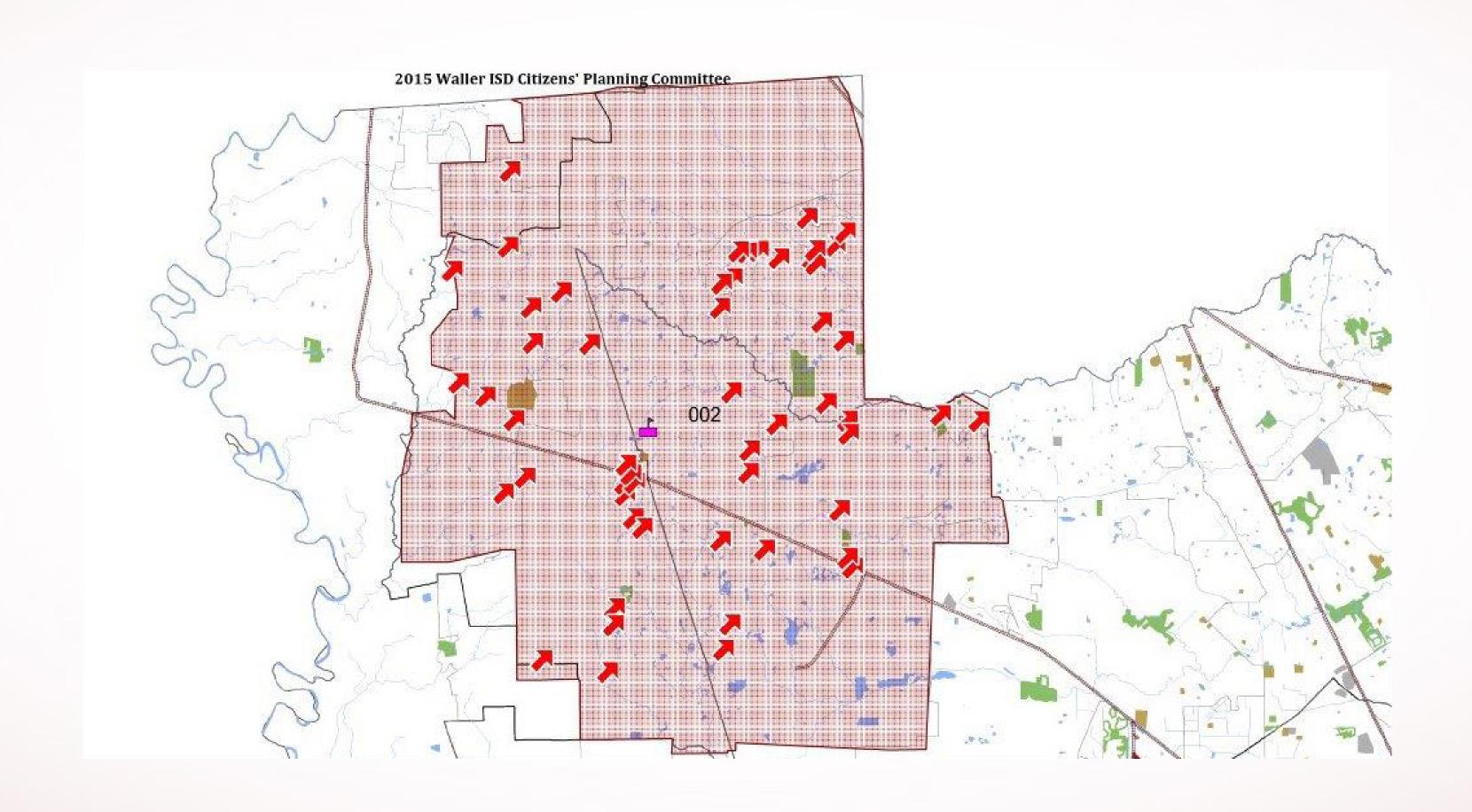

WHAT IS A BOND ELECTION?

- Texas public schools rely on the support of local taxpayers to fund construction and facility improvements
- School districts borrow money in the form of bonds to finance design, construction, expansion and renovation of facilities. This is similar to homeowners borrowing money in the form of a mortgage to finance a home
- Bonds are approved by voters in a bond election, then sold to investors in the competitive investment market to raise money to pay for capital needs
- Last Bond Issue 8 years ago in 2007

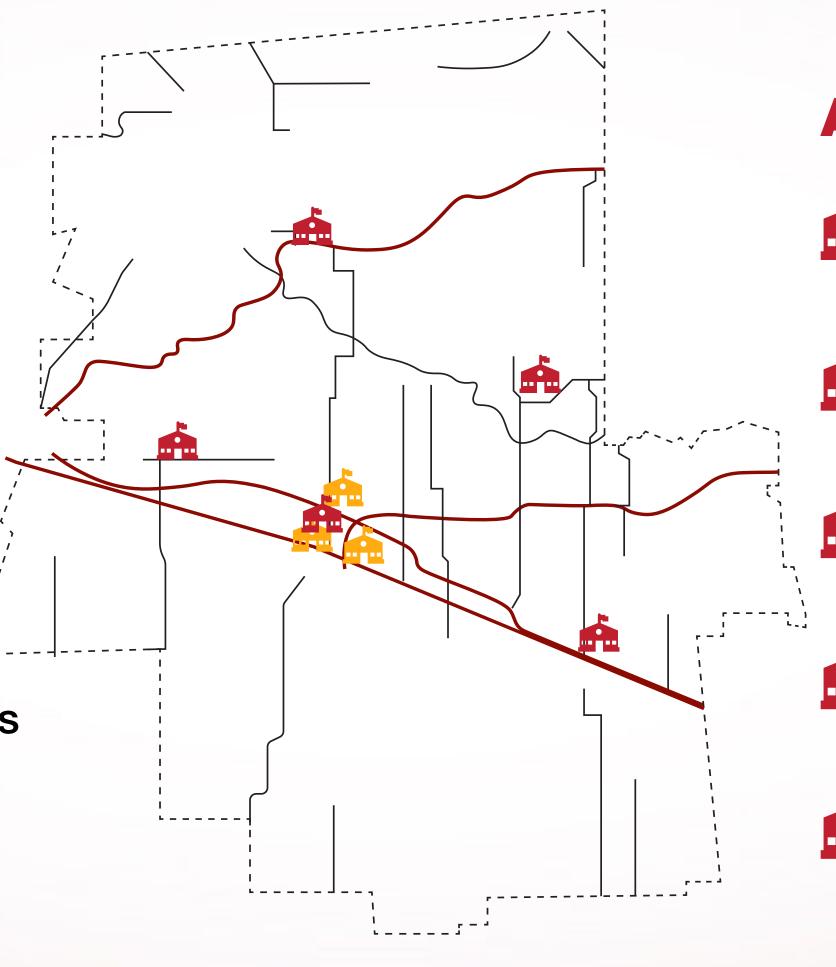

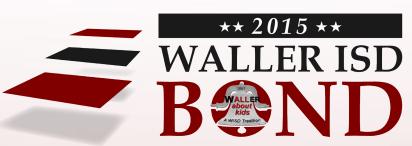

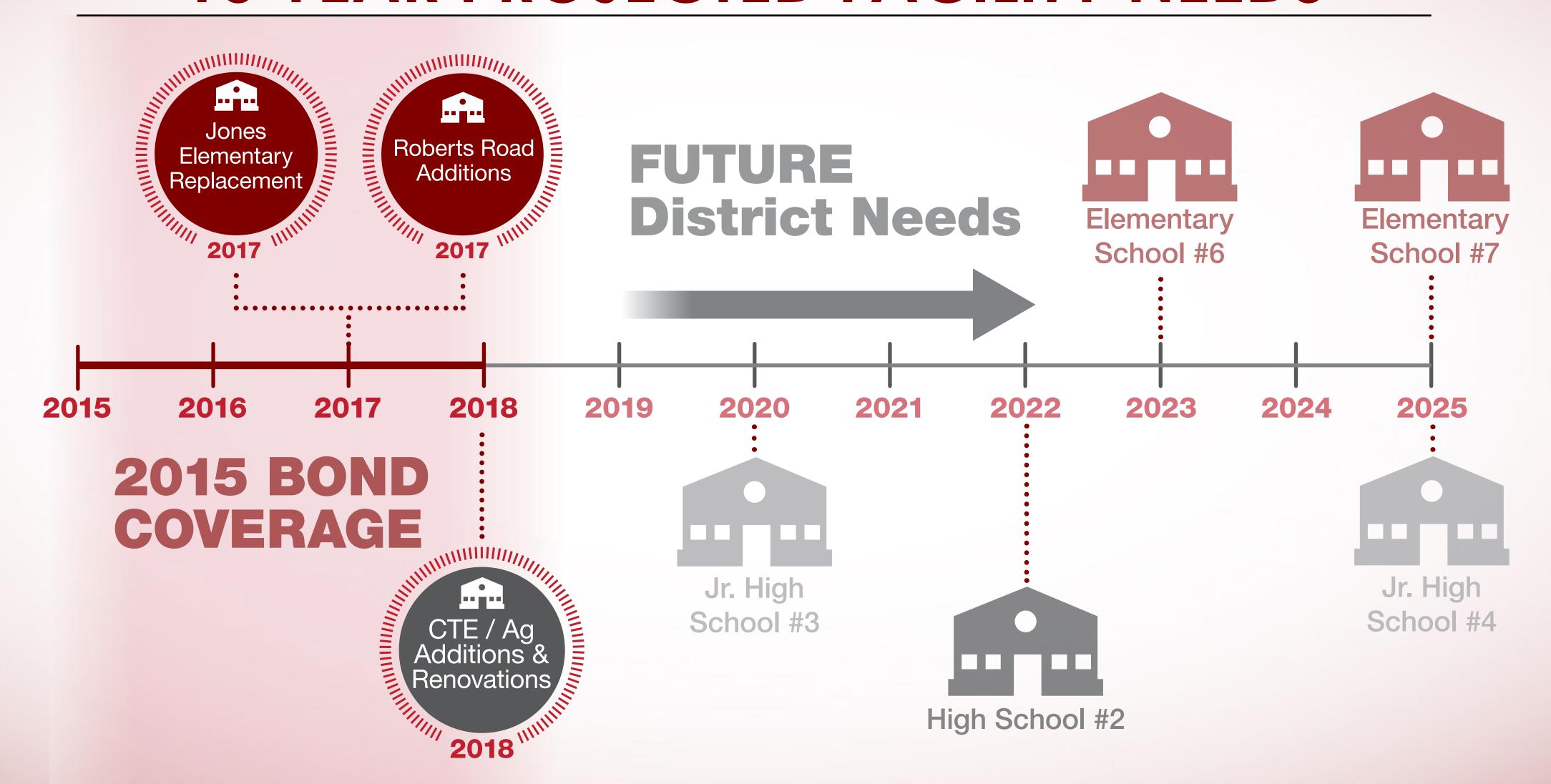

- Furniture, fixtures and equipment



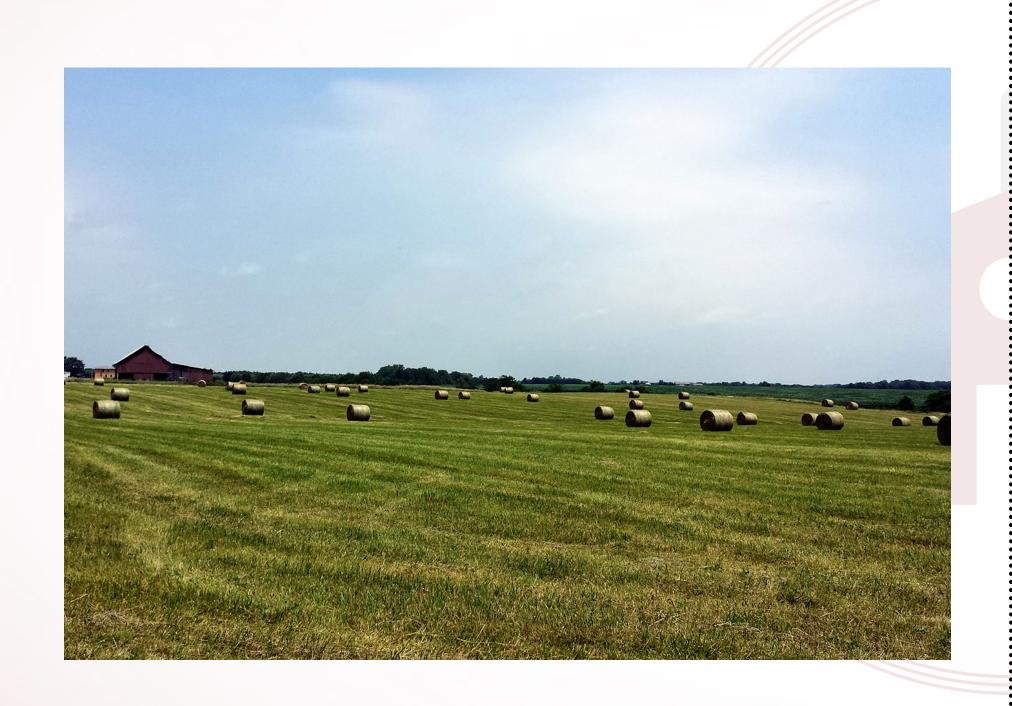
STUDENT GROWTH PORTABLE CLASSROOMS



- 9 Portable Classrooms
 @ \$80,000 each

 - * E. Turlington Elementary School
- 3-5 Year solution to address student growth

WHY?

- » Over 70% of Waller High School students are enrolled in at least 1 CTE course :
- » House Bill 5 graduation requirements by the State Board of Education

- * Renovate existing CTE Building to include larger, air conditioned shops and locker rooms
- * Construct 2 new Ag shops with supporting classrooms and locker rooms
- * Furniture, fixtures and equipment

TRANSPORTATION



WHY?

- » Aging fleet over half are 15 years old or older
- » Student growth requires more routes
- Buses \$ 3,849,871
 - * 30 Regular Education Buses
 - * 9 Special Needs Buses
- Additional Bus Parking
 \$ 500,000

WHY?

- Aging computer inventory
- » Aging technology infrastructure now inadequate
- District-Wide Computer Replacements
 \$ 1,430,000
 - * Student, Classroom, Lab and Teacher
- District-Wide Technology Infrastructure: \$ 870,000
 - * MDF (Main Distribution Frames)
 - * IDF (Intermediate Distribution Frames)
- District-Wide Wireless Access Points (Wi-Fi) \$ 708,000

- All new construction and renovations will be complete by Fall of 2018



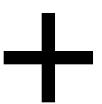

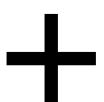


ESTIMATED MAXIMUM WISD TAX RATE WITH PASSAGE OF BOND ELECTION

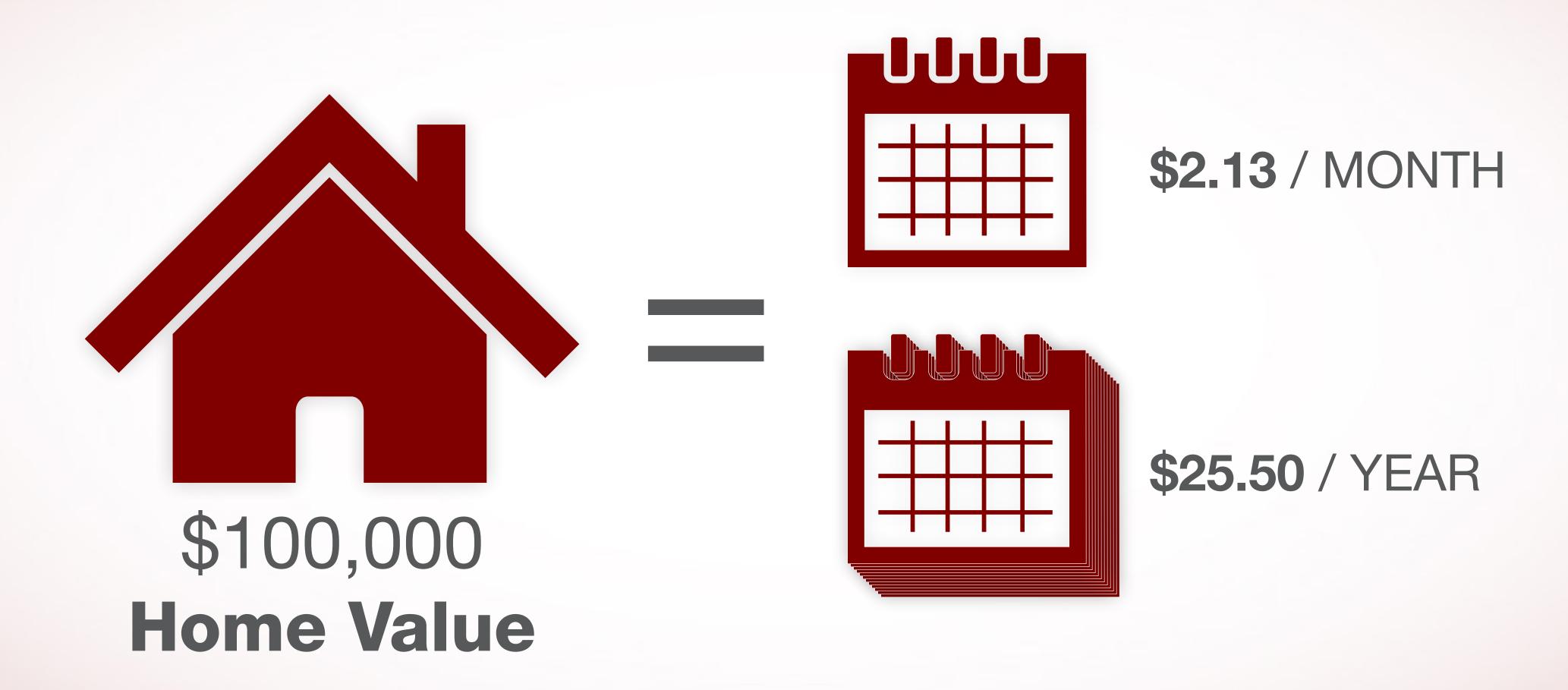
